A Gift to the World: Co-Laborers for the Healing of Brokenness

The Proposed Full-Communion Agreement between The United Methodist and Episcopal Churches

WHAT DOES IT DO?

- Recognizes that each church is a valid part of the one, holy catholic and apostolic church.
- Allows for clergy from one denomination to serve in the other (with the approval of local bishops).
- Requires United Methodist bishops be present at Episcopal consecrations and Episcopal bishops at United Methodist consecrations.

WHAT DOES IT NOT DO?

- Merge church government or congregations.
- Change worship and liturgy in either denomination's churches.
- Change the way wine and/or grape juice is used in either denomination.
- Require either denomination to adopt the discipline or moral teaching of the other.

On the night before he died, Jesus prayed that we as Christians might be one (John 17:22). This agreement is yet another step in following our Lord's command. This agreement "Closes the loop." Methodists and Episcopalians are already both in Full Communion with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Moravian Church (Northern and Southern Provinces). The agreement between The Episcopal Church and the United Methodist Church is the missing link.

JUNE LOVE OFFERING

Lutheran Support Group of Gaston County

Our love offerings for the month of **June** will be for the Lutheran Support Group of Gaston which provides ongoing support for Faith Farm, Bess Town Road property (now known as Camp Centurion) and Mountain Ridge Group Homes. A coalition of Lutheran Churches helps with maintenance and upkeep of these homes and works with Lutheran Services Carolinas and other agencies to provide the use of these properties owned by LSGG for needs in our community.

Mountain Ridge Group Home is still providing help to residents in Gastonia. It is operated by Lutheran Services Carolinas. It is a Medicaid and Medicare certified 6 bed Care Facility for individuals with intellectual and physical disabilities and other related conditions. The program provides 24/hour care and rehabilitation to support residents.

Faith Farm in Dallas is currently being used by Lutheran Services Carolinas and Mountain Ridge Group Home as an extended facility for daily activities for their residents.

The Bess Town Road property has been renovated as a home for homeless male veterans. The facility is currently providing 3 veterans a home and hopefully enabling them to eventually move to a home of their own. This property is now known as Camp Centurion. The Lutheran Support group has been working with Camp Centurion to use the Bess Town Road property. Camp Centurion is a non-profit agency whose mission is to provide local veterans who are experiencing a difficult transition from military to civilian life, with the essential secure environment, services and support they need to be able to finally "come home", regardless of the length of time since discharge.

Your generous donations are greatly needed and appreciated as the ministry of these homes continue to serve the needs of our community.

Brief History of the Lutheran Chapel Church Sanctuary Building

In August 1922, a committee of five church members, including the pastor, was elected to investigate whether to build a new church or renovate the existing 1874 structure. A new structure was recommended after securing a \$10,000 donation and unanimously approved by the congregation in September 1922. The project was completed and the first service in the new sanctuary was held June 8, 1924. The cost of the sanctuary, including furnishings, was \$51,000. The sanctuary featured incredible stained-glass windows (see "Our Stained Glass Windows" insert) and a prominent steeple.

Since 1924 the church has undergone several major renovations to enhance access, enrich music programs, and make the building better to meet the needs of the church family and community. Work has been led by committees and funded through member and memorial donations. Care has always been taken to keep the original character of the church in each renovation.

In 1969, all areas of the building were renovated. On the outside, all doors were replaced, and the building was sandblasted to give it a fresh appearance. On the inside, the electrical system was reworked to modern standards, the organ was completely rebuilt, and the furniture/pews were refinished. Access was improved by adding two side entrances and removing the side pews. The basement was renovated with updated bathrooms and a youth lounge. Keeping with the trend of the time, wall-to-wall carpet was added.

In 2008, the organ was completely rebuilt with new pipes and the altar was reconfigured to enhance the sound. The wall-to-wall carpet was removed, wood floors were sanded and refinished, and new carpet was placed down the aisles.

The sound system has been replaced several times and most recently due to the covid pandemic, video streaming equipment was added which extends the reach of our worship services. Currently underway, the courtyard and the plants around the sanctuary are being refreshed.

Even after 100 years, the church continues to serve us well thanks to the love and dedication of the Lutheran Chapel Church family.

Our Stained Glass Windows

When our church was built in 1924, our forefathers had the forethought to use stained glass windows to awaken the spirit while it beautifies our church.

Families in our church gave each window as a memorial gift. The cost of the large windows was \$700.00 each. The small windows cost \$300.00 each.

The windows all depict scenes in the life of Jesus. The story begins on the left side at the rear of the church, facing the altar. Then it returns to the right rear to continue the story.

As you walk to each window, take this scripture with you to reflect on the life of Christ!

First Window-The Magnificat

And Mary Said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for He has regarded the low estate of his handmaiden. For behold, henceforth all generations will call me blessed; for He who is mighty has done great things for me, and holy is His name." ~ Luke 1:46-49

Second Window-Jesus in the temple

"And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." \sim Luke 2:52

Third Window-Miracles

"the blind receive their sight, and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them." \sim Matthew 11:5

"Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight." $\widetilde{}$ Luke 24:31

Fourth Window-Lily (Over the Door)

"²⁸And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, ²⁹yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ³⁰But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you — you of little faith? ³¹Therefore do not worry, saying, 'What will we eat?' or 'What will we drink?' or 'What will we wear?' ³²For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. ³³But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." ~ Matthew 6:28-33

Fifth Window-I am the Alpha and the Omega (Left Large Window)

"¹The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want. ²He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; ³he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths for his name's sake. ⁴Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff — they comfort me. ³You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. ⁶Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long." ~ Psalm 23

Sixth Window-The Triumphant Entry and Passover (back rear on right facing altar)

"Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!" \sim Mark 11:9

"²⁴and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁵In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." \sim 1 Corinthians 11:24-25

Seventh Window-Jesus on the Cross, Gethsemane

"" Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last." \sim Luke 23:46

"42Again he went away for the second time and prayed, "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done." \sim Matthew 26:42

Eighth Window-Appearing to Mary Magdalene and the Other Mary

"3His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow." $\widetilde{}$ Matthew 28:3

Ninth Window-Clematis (Window over Door)

Tenth Window-The Ascension of our Lord, The Great Commission (Large Window on Right)

"¹⁹Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." ~ Matthew 28:19-20

MUSIC NOTES

This Month, Lutheran Chapel celebrates a big anniversary. In honor of the 100th anniversary of this Sanctuary building, we have focused our music choices on music that not only connects with the readings of the day but also connects to music available in 1924, with one notable exception. Here is a little information about this music.



The prelude was published in 1923 and written by Theodore DuBois, born Clément François Théodore Dubois (1837 – 1924). He was a French Romantic composer, organist, and music teacher who spent most of his career at The Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde, Conservatoire de Paris and the Church of the Madeleine.

The tune for our first hymn, SLANE, in a traditional Irish melody that was first published in 1909. It was arranged into hymnody in 1919.

The Musical Offering, "O God Beyond All Praising", while arranged by Hal H. Hopson with a text by Michael A. Perry (1982) is set to music from the Jupiter movement in "The Planets" written by Gustav Holst between 1914-1916.





Our last hymn, "Go, My Children, with My Blessing", while the music (Ar hyd y nos) was first published in 1906, the words were written by Jaroslav J. Vajda (1919 – 2008). This hymn was specifically chosen to mark our connection to our past (when the building was built) as well as our future that we are creating with God's help.

Finally, the postlude, "Grand Chorus", was written by **Félix-Alexandre Guilmant** ; 1837 –1911. He was a French organist and composer. He was the organist of La Trinité, helped found the Schola Cantorum de Paris and was Professor of Organ in the Conservatoire de Paris. Guilmant was an accomplished and extremely prolific composer. Unlike others who produced music in all the main genres, Guilmant devoted himself almost entirely to works for his own instrument, the organ. His music continues to be well-received.
